Objective

Learn the days of the week and how to talk about your schedule using simple present tense.

Days of the Week

Day	Pronunciation Tip
Monday	/'mʌn.deɪ/
Tuesday	/'tju:z.deɪ/ or /'tu:z.deɪ/
Wednesday	/'wenz.deɪ/
Thursday	/'θɜ:rz.deɪ/
Friday	/'fraɪ.deɪ/
Saturday	/'sæt.ər.deɪ/
Sunday	/'sʌn.deɪ/

Remember: Days of the week are always capitalized in English.

Talking About Your Schedule

Use the **present simple tense** with the days of the week:

- I **work** on Mondays.
- She **studies** on Tuesdays.
- We **don't have class** on Fridays.

Useful time expressions:

- **on Monday / on Tuesdays**
- **every Friday**
- **at the weekend (UK) / on the weekend (US)**
- **in the morning / afternoon / evening**

Tip: "On" + Day

In English, we say **on Monday**, **on the weekend** (US), or **at the weekend** (UK).

Examples:

- I have class **on Monday**.
- We go out **on Fridays**.
