

MINI-LESSON 6: POSSESSIVE ADJECTIVES & PRONOUNS



Learn how to use possessive adjectives and possessive pronouns to show ownership in English.

What's the Difference?

Subject Pronoun	Possessive Adjective	Possessive Pronoun
1/	my	mine
you	your	yours
he	his	his
she	her	hers
it	its	
we	our	ours
they	their	theirs

Remember:

- A possessive adjective comes before a noun.
- A possessive pronoun stands alone and replaces the noun.

Possessive Adjectives

They describe **whose** thing it is and come before a noun:

- This is **my** book.
- Is that your phone?
- That's **his** jacket.



• We love **our** dog.

Possessive Pronouns

They replace a noun phrase:

- This book is mine.
- Is that phone yours?
- The jacket is his.
- The dog is ours.

Don't say: This is mine book

Say: This is my book OR This book is mine

Mini Dialogue

A: Is this your pen?

B: No, it's not mine. It's hers.

A: Oh! I thought it was his.

B: No, **his** pen is blue.
