

MINI-LESSON 8: DEMONSTRATIVES – THIS, THAT, THESE, THOSE



Learn how to use **this, that, these,** and **those** to refer to things based on their **distance** and **number**.

What Are Demonstratives?

Demonstratives are words we use to point to things—based on how close they are and whether they are singular or plural.

Distance	Singular	Plural
Near	this	these
Far	that	those

Examples

♦ This – singular & near

This is my phone. (You're holding it or it's right here.)

♦ That – singular & far

That is her car. (It's across the street.)

♦ These – plural & near

These are my keys. (You're holding them.)

♦ Those – plural & far

Those are your shoes. (They're by the door.)
